Early works start at old KPS



Early works are now underway on the Old Kyneton Primary School redevelopment project.

The early works will include various building and services investigations to develop a better understanding of the existing conditions and assist with finalising the design and preparation for construction. The early works were expected to continue for approximately 7 weeks.

Temporary fencing has been erected at the site. Only the basketball court area remains outside the fenced project zone.

All works during this initial period will be contained within the building itself. Last week work was taking place in the bluestone building.

A spokesperson for Creative Victoria informed *Kyneton Connect* that the bluestone building investigative works have commenced to better understand the conditions of that building and remove any hazardous materials.

The playgrounds situated on site will not be accessible during this early period and during major building work next year.

Following these investigations and the finalisation of the design, building works will commence. Creative Victoria has advised that the eastern grassed area will be used for site logistics throughout the project but the basketball courts continue to be available, and they encourage community members keen on hiring that area to contact Creative Victoria and Working Heritage to discuss potential use and access.

The ABC's Gardening Australia highlights Kyneton

Kyneton and the Daffodil and Arts Festival received wonderful coverage on the ABC's Gardening Australia program, screened on Nov 25.

The visit of celebrities Costa Georgiadis and Millie Ross and the crew could not have provided a better advertisement for the Festival, daffodils and the town with their 2 day visit to Kyneton.

Not only did they take part in the Parade and Fair celebrations but visited an open garden, Rosebery Hill the home of Barry and Ruth Murphy, and their part in the history of the Festival.

The program, broadcast Australia wide, drew an incredibly large audience, with the Festival receiving calls after it was screened from interstate viewers wishing to book accommodation for next year's Festival.

Last week Gardening Australia won the Australian Academy of Cinema and Television Arts (AACTA) Award for Best Lifestyle Program.

Mary-Anne Thomas holds Seat



Mary-Anne and supporters on election night Member for Macedon Labor's Mary-Anne Thomas comfortably retained her seat in the State election.

There was a 3.8% 2pp swing to the Liberals in Macedon, but some swing was considered likely given the massive 9.3% swing Mary-Anne achieved in the 2018 election.

Kyneton ALP members were pleased with the result here where there was a 3.2% swing to Labor at the Sports & Aquatic Centre booth, taking Labor's 2pp vote there to 70%.

Kyneton Labor President Eric Dearricott said it was a well deserved outcome for Mary-Anne who had done so much for the town, especially the new Kyneton Primary School and the major works at Kyneton High.

Kyneton Stonemason Huntly Barton who ran as an independent gained a primary vote of 5.4%.

For the first time Kyneton had an early voting centre in Saleyards Rd with 5400 people taking advantage of the chance to vote before polling day.

Premier Dan Andrews has reappointed Mary-Anne to the challenging Minister for Health position but has added Leader of the House (Legislative Assembly) to her responsibilities.

Mary-Anne, who lives in Kyneton, is likely to be joined by another Kyneton resident, Georgie Purcell of the Animal Justice Party who is well placed to win a seat in the Upper House for Northern Victoria Region. Page I

Horticultural Society cancels 2023 Spring Flower Show

The Kyneton Horticultural Society Committee has decided to cancel its Spring Flower Show.

In an email to the Kyneton Daffodil & Arts Festival in mid-October Society President Nicholas Scott said that it has been a struggle to get entries this year as Spring was so late and that the cancellation was a trial.

The Spring Flower Show has been a key element of the Kyneton Daffodil and Arts Festival since the Festival's inception in 1973, but even before that on its own was one of Victoria's major daffodil show events, drawing entries from all over the State. At that time Kyneton and district was the home of many of the State's top daffodil breeders.

The commencement of the Daffodil and Arts Festival was a partnership between the Horticultural Society and the Daffodil & Arts Festival with the Festival starting on the first weekend in Spring to avoid clashes with other major Flower Shows.

Kyneton has been regarded as one of the top Spring Flower Shows and continued to attract Show exhibitors from across the state as well as locally. All flowers on show, not just daffodils were of a high standard and the Show drew many visitors to the town.

Representatives of the Festival have met with the Society's Executive to ask them to reconsider the cancellation, but they remained steadfast in their decision to cancel.

At its general meeting following its AGM on Dec 6 the entire membership of the Festival decided to write to the Horticultural Society to ask them to again reconsider their decision to cancel the 2023 Kyneton Spring Flower Show.

"Our coverage on the ABC's Gardening Australia has generated Australia wide interest in Kyneton and its daffodils and is likely to result in many more visitors to the district in 2023.

"What will those visitors think if we don't even have a Flower Show to exhibit our signature flower and the other blooms that flourish here?

"We do hope the members of the Horticultural Society decide to reverse the decision to cancel" Daffodil & Arts Festival President Peter Henderson said.

Barkly Square Reconstruction



The Barkly Square sports field reconstruction project, funded by the Victorian Government and the Macedon Ranges Shire Council, was due to commence in early October 2022.

However, the recent wet weather delayed the project's start.

Works have now started on site.

"It is hoped that favourable weather will continue so the reconstruction works can progress.

"Council now expects work completion around March/April 2023. "The ground will remain closed for the 2023 winter season to allow the establishment of the new turf surface" Shane Walden the Council's Director Assets and Operations said. The Barkly Square sports field reconstruction will include: stripping, cultivating and re-grading of the existing playing surface; removal of the existing turf wicket table; installation of a new sub-surface irrigation system; installation of a new sub-surface drainage system; installation of new sporting infrastructure for soccer and cricket, and resurfacing the playing field with warm season grass.

Ron Cole, President of the major user of the Square, the Kyneton District Soccer Club told Kyneton Connect that the Club had expected that Barkly Square would not be available for the Club to use for the 2023 season and was negotiating to ensure that players would have both training and playing facilities in 2023.

Kyneton Show breaks record



It was hot and sunny one day, cold and wet the next, but it didn't matter at all as a record 8,000 people turned out for the 160th Kyneton Show on Nov. 18 and 19.

The sun shone on the Friday carnival and more than 3,000 people took advantage of the blue skies and warm temperatures, doubling the previous record. Young families joined local teenagers waiting for the gates to open, excited to be able to hang out with their friends again after no show for three years.

The weather turned on Show Day but the 5,000 strong crowd was still a record, up by more than 1,000, with total attendance up by more than 30 per cent.

Kyneton Agricultural Society secretary Josie Rutledge said the show's success reflects how much it's valued by the community.

"Thank you to everyone who came to the show. You're the reason why we love putting on the show and why it's growing," Mrs Rutledge said. "There was just so much joy on both days and it was just wonderful to see everybody gathering as a community together again."

She thanked all those who entered their animals or dressed pets and youngsters to participate in the children's pet parade while hundreds more entered the pavilion competition with a record 2,571 entries, continuing a tradition that started at the first Show in 1858.

The new LEGO pavilion under the grandstand was so successful, plans are already underway for an even bigger competition next year.

There were also record entries in the children's pet parade and the first tied result, then another, with judges unable to choose between a calf and a lamb, with another tie for the first blue-tongued lizard and an unflappable chook.

A surprise finale to the legendary Friday night fireworks impressed the huge crowd gathered in and around the grandstand. Free laser tag in the hay bales was a carnival highlight, transformed on Show Day to a farminspired obstacle course with the rain just another challenge to conquer for hardy country kids.

"The show only happens because of every single one of the volunteers who come and help to make it all possible," Mrs Rutledge said.

"It's an enormous effort but everyone just shares that enthusiasm to make it the best show we can and seeing so many happy people just makes us smile."

Visit Victoria and the Macedon Ranges Shire council were major sponsors, while the state government funded free admission for children 14 years and under. Many local businesses generously provided funding and in-kind contributions as well as generous prizes for the fund-raising raffle. "That support is just so crucial so that we can keep admission prices affordable and provide so many free events and activities," Mrs Rutledge said.

The 2023 Kyneton Show will be on November 17 and 18, 2023.

Junior Football teams & Senior

Women's teams to change leagues Kyneton Football Netball Club (KFNC) Junior Football teams will make the move to the Riddell District Football League (RDFNL), transferring from the Bendigo Junior Football League (BJFL) in season 2023.

An assessment of KFNC junior registrations over the past 10 years identified a steady decline in the number of junior teams with the Club recording 12 teams in 2014 and 7 teams in 2022.

President, Hayden Evans said "Our junior participants are extremely important to the long-term sustainability of our Club and that is why we have developed a subcommittee to undertake a thorough review process to assist in growing our junior numbers."

The review identified that aligning with RDJFNL would support our junior players to participate against teams in the Macedon Ranges, reduce travel distances and play home games with all junior teams on the same day.

Junior Football Director, Daniel Murray said "Having all our junior teams playing together during home games is a substantial benefit to our junior parents and players. It enabling families to watch multiple children playing matches at the showgrounds reserve which supports a strong family culture at our Club.

The KFNC will continue to align with the Bendigo Football Netball League for the Senior Football and Netball teams and the RDJFNL for its junior boys and girls football teams.

President, Hayden Evans said "Our Club is looking forward to joining the RDIFNL next season and

> recognise that we need to implement additional actions to support our junior development and retention to improve our junior numbers moving forward."

The Kyneton FNC Senior Women's Football Team will move to the new Riddell District Football Netball League (RDFNL) Women's Football Competition for the 2023 season,

after a successful three years playing in the Central Victorian Women's Football League (CVFLW).

The RDFNL provided a proposal to the club in October about the prospect of a new Senior Women's Competition in the region.

After an extensive review and consultation process with players, coaches and Kyneton FNC, it was decided the RDNFL league would provide the greatest opportunity for growth and development for the senior women's side.
